Artist/homemaker making great strides

Women in the art world usually face the same barriers as women striving to break into other professions in this scountry.

And a woman whose primary profession is mother and homenaker faces tougher barriers than most as she struggles to make herself known as a serious artist. Galveston resident Jane Galveston resident Jane Altensworth is a fine example of a determined, talented artist who has made great strides as an abstract painter while living a "nonartist's life" as a homemaker and mother.

Jane first came to the island in 1959. She left and returned in 1963 and seemed to be on the way to a regular life when, as a medical technologist, she married Dr. Dan Allansworth

Allensworth.

Jane Allensworth had harbored
the dream of being an artist since
childhood. So strong was her urge
that her father tried to persuade
her to be a medical illustrator, in
order to allow her some artistic
freedom without what he felt
would be obligatory artistic starvation.

vation.
Soon after she married, a friend gave her a set of oil paints, just for fun. Jane's need to paint grew, and by the time both her children had been born she began to take art classes.

Unlike many husbands, Jane's was supportive. When she decided to commute to Houston to take art

classes with famous painter Doro-thy Hood, he was proud of her tal-ent and even got her household help so she could pursue her dream.

Her persistence began to pay off by the early 70s. Her work began to be accepted in juried exhibitions. In 1973, she was invited to enter a woman's art exhibit. Her work was displayed at the new Tibor de'Nagy Gallery in Houston. By 1981, the confirmation of her talent was a completely soid out one-woman show at the Houston Watson Gallery.

Like much abstract art, Jane's work is complicated and hard to translate to written description. Abstract art essentially deals with using color and form in a manuer that suggests and creates mood and feeling in the onlooker.

Jane describes it as 'non-objective art that is expressive and full of content.' For example, a recent painting is one she tentalityely has ittled the 'Marriage Series.' It contains two standing figures of orange and violet curved at the top in opposite directions. She ex-

plains the work as symbolic of partners looking out for each oth-er. And, indeed, the mood evoked is a protective or

er. And, indeed, the mood evoked is a protective one.

A number of her paintings are done with serial washes. She shades colors, by repetitively washing the canvas in acrylic paints rather than using a brush. This technique gives her light in the work. She likes the idea of light coming from within a painting, rather than just using reflected light.

This dramatic technique leaves her the freedom to experiment with shaped canvases such as her large trapezoidal shaped work. These works are not the only examples of the kinds of paintings she produces, because she is inspired to work with a myriad number of forms, although her colors seem always to be warm and subdued.

Although she has been busy with

Although she has been busy with her work, she has found the time to be quite active in other local activities. She was quite active in the old Galveston Arts Council and is still a very active in the Galveston Art League. In 1979, she even served as campaign manager for Mayor Jan Coggesshall. And throughout it all, she has involved her children and husband in the process.

process,
She continues to paint in a studio space at her lovely home in near West Galveston. In 1988, she had a solo exhibit at the Watson Gallery and is working on ideas for future exhibitions.

Jane loves Galveston and says, "Galveston is a wonderful place to make art in. The ambience here is so conducive to artistic expression and there are an unusually large number of other artists here to be stimulated by."

Jane's Inspirations have led her to be listed in the "Archives of American Art." That's quite an lonor for her and for the island that has inspired her art.
