1. '4:48 Psychosis'

Sarah Kane's visceral, probing and darkly humorous play "4:48 Psychosis" enters its final weekend and serves as appointment viewing on its own merits, though it feels particularly resonant more than 18 months into a trying period of pandemic-prompted lockdown. Kane's play draws its curious title from a point of peak chemical imbalance for the brain, and the dark - and darkly funny - play pries deep into the recesses that yield clinical depression. Poet and actor T. Lavois Thiebaud stars, and Catastrophic Theatre's Jason Nodler directs.


